

Registering to Vote in Pierce County

Registration Qualifications

To register to vote in Pierce County, you must be:

- A citizen of the United States;
- At least 18 years of age by the date of the next election;
- A resident of Pierce County;
- Not presently denied your civil rights as a result of a felony conviction.

Registration Locations

You may obtain registration forms at:

- Pierce County Election Department;
- All city and town clerks' offices;
- All public schools;
- All state offices;
- All rural public libraries;
- All City of Tacoma fire stations;
- All manned fire stations in unincorporated Pierce County.

Or, you can have a form mailed to you by calling the Election Department at (253) 798-7430 or if long distance, 1-800-446-4979.

In order for you to vote at the polls, your mail-in registration form must be postmarked 30 days before any upcoming election.

However, if you have been a resident of Pierce County for at least 30 days prior to an election, you may register to vote in person at the Election Department no less than 15 days prior to the election and must vote by absentee ballot for that election only.

Motor Voter Registration

At the time you acquire or renew your Washington State driver's license, you will have the opportunity to register to vote.

Name Change

If you change your name, you must complete a new registration form. You can come by in person, or call and we will mail you an application.

After You Have Registered

After you have registered, your completed registration card is sent to the Pierce County Election Department to be filed on a computer system. Your districts will be assigned based on the geographical location of your residential address. At the polls, you will only be allowed to vote for candidates and measures that apply to your districts. About three weeks after registering, you will be mailed a voter registration card which shows your polling place, congressional and legislative districts.

Moving ?

Within Pierce County: You may notify the Election Department in person, by mail, or by phone. Or, you may fill out a "Voter Change of Address" card at your local post office. You will need to supply your old and new addresses and date of birth.

Out of Pierce County: You must re-register to vote in your new county or state. You may notify us in writing to cancel your old registration in Pierce County.

Cancellation of Registration

You will only be removed from the registration files if you fill out a cancellation card or register to vote in another county or state. If a voter is deceased, another voter may fill out a death card or send a note to cancel his or her registration.

Did you know...

Every ten years, Pierce County elects a 21 member Commission to review and recommend amendments to the Pierce County Charter. The commission is made up of 21 citizens; three representatives from each of the seven County Council districts. These citizens are charged with making proposed amendments to the Pierce County Charter which are then voted upon by the citizens of Pierce County. The filing period for Charter Review Commission candidates took place during the normal filing period, July 25 – 29, 2005. Candidates filed for one of three positions for each County Council District. If three or more people filed for one position, they appear on the primary ballot and in this voters' pamphlet. The top two votegetters will go on to the General Election ballot. For those races with two or fewer candidates, they go straight to the General Election ballot. The member who receives the greatest number of votes in the General Election shall convene the commission.

Charter Review Commission Qualification Requirements:

- Must have been a resident of the County for a period of at least five years preceding the election.
- Must be a registered voter.
- Must reside in the Council District of the position for which they are filing.
- Charter amendments proposed by the Commission will be submitted to the voters at the General Election in 2006.

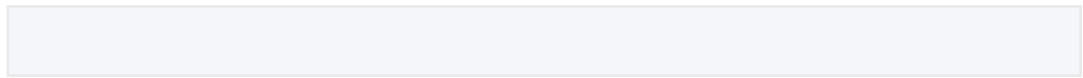

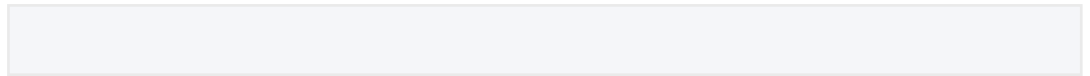

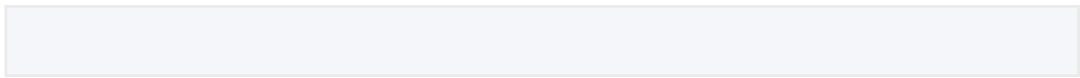

Ballot Title: Shall the City of Sumner be authorized to continue to impose regular property tax levies of \$.50 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation for each of the six (6) consecutive years, beginning with the levy year of 2005, to be used for the provision of Emergency Paramedic and Medical Care and Services?

Explanatory Statement: In 1999, the electors of the City of Sumner approved a six-year property tax levy of \$.50 per \$1,000 assessed valuation for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) purposes beginning in 2000. This property tax levy, if approved by the voters, will continue the present EMS levy for another six-year period (2006 through 2011).

Most fire department responses are for medical emergencies. Funds raised by this EMS levy will continue to pay the costs of providing Advanced Life Support (paramedic level) emergency medical services and meet the emergency medical needs arising from the community's rapid growth and increasing demand for services. The funds will allow for personnel, education and training, and provide the means to meet inflationary increases in the cost of supplies, equipment, repairs and maintenance.

Renewal of our current Emergency Medical Services Levy is necessary to retain the paramedic service provided by our fire department. 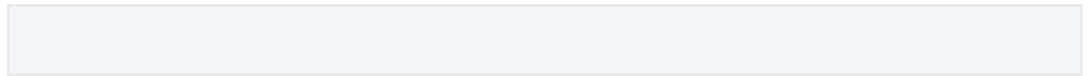

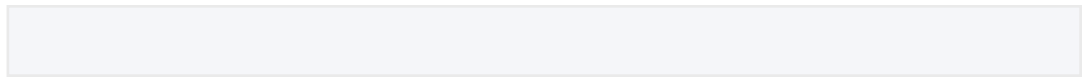

Approval of this proposition would maintain the EMS tax levy rate at \$.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2006, and would allow the Fire District to maintain the high level of services it provides to the community. Rejection of this proposition would lead to the loss of approximately \$900,000 in projected tax revenue, which could affect the Fire District's ability to continue its level of services.

Statement For:

Essential services need funding.

Our local fire department needs our support. They respond to you in your time of need. Now it's your turn to respond to them. The firefighters and paramedics are keeping up with our rapidly growing community. Increased emergency calls have not delayed their response to you and your family. Should Proposition No. 1 be approved or rejected?

Explanatory Statement: If approved by the voters, the District will be authorized to levy regular real property taxes at a rate not to exceed \$1.50 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. The actual levy rate will be established by the Board of Commissioners. The current levy rate is \$1.488 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation.

The restoration of the \$1.50 tax levy rate will provide the funding necessary to maintain the current level of services, fire fighter staffing, equipment and facilities and to provide for the purchase of equipment and apparatus to continue to improve services for the protection of life and property in the District and to enhance public safety.

If the levy is approved, the maximum tax on a \$100,000 assessed valuation residence would not exceed \$150.00 each year or approximately \$12.50 per month for the fire protection and emergency medical services provided by the District.

Statement For:

Please help South Pierce Fire & Rescue maintain its' current delivery level of paramedic and firefighting services. Vote yes for the regular tax levy reauthorization. If passed, Proposition No. 2 would permit the District to levy for collection beginning in 2006 a regular property tax for emergency medical services at the rate of \$.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, which is the same rate authorized for collection in 2005, thereby lifting the revenue limitation in Chapter 84.55 RCW. Should Proposition No. 2 be approved or rejected?

Explanatory Statement: The voters of the District previously approved a six year emergency medical services (EMS) tax levy of \$0.50 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation to fund basic emergency medical services provided by the District. The levy is subject to the 101% real property tax limitation.

If approved by the voters this measure will authorize the District to exceed the 101% limitation and maintain the EMS property tax levy at a rate not to exceed \$0.50 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation.

The tax revenue must be used by the District exclusively for emergency medical services. Approval of the levy will allow the District to maintain and improve the level of services currently provided on a continuing basis including paramedic services.

If the levy is approved, the EMS tax on a \$100,000 assessed valuation residence would not exceed \$50.00 each year or approximately \$4.17 per month for the emergency medical services.

Statement For:

Please help South Pierce Fire & Rescue continue to provide paramedic ambulance service. Vote yes for the Emergency Medical Services tax levy reauthorization. This ballot measure will not create a new tax. This is a request to allow your local fire department to collect the true amount authorized by State law. Ballot Title: Shall Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 17 be authorized to impose regular property tax levies of fifty cents (\$.50) or less per one thousand dollars (\$1,000) of assessed valuation for each of six consecutive years, beginning in 2005, for basic and advanced (paramedic) emergency medical services?

Explanatory Statement: The Board of Commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 17 has unanimously passed a resolution requesting an election to authorize a property tax levy in an amount not to exceed fifty cents per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation, each year for six (6) consecutive years. This levy would ensure that District No. 17 would be able to provide round the clock paramedic service, thus reducing long response times from private ambulance firms.

Currently, 76% of all department 911 calls are for emergency medical services. Emergency medical aid calls have increased 70% since 1999. Current funding provides for fire prevention, but does not provide funds for an adequate level of emergency medical services. If approved by the voters, the levy will enable the district to hire additional certified paramedics and emergency medical technicians. For the first time, the district would be able to provide both advanced life support and basic life support on a permanent basis, in this 52 square mile district.

Also, through a membership program, District 17 would cease ambulance charges to local citizens and residents. This means that only the insured portion of the ambulance bill would be paid. Taxpayers are deemed to have paid through taxation.

Statement For:

How soon do you want us? Pierce County Fire District 17 needs your help and support to make our community a safer place to live and work. Voting yes for this levy will generate enough funds to fully staff a paramedic unit 24/7. Currently, we depend on a private ambulance from Tacoma, which average 42 minutes response time, to over 50% of our paramedic calls. District 17 paramedic units currently average 9 minutes response time. Support for this levy will reduce response time and provide more efficient, cost effective service. Your yes vote will also allow us to centralize our resources by creating living quarters at our Lacamas station. So we ask you: Is saving a life worth 50 cents? Please support the EMS Levy by voting *Yes* on Tuesday, September 20, 2005.

Ballot Title: The Board of Fire Commissioners of Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 18 passed Resolution No. 2005-25 concerning an increase in the fire protection services levy rate. If passed, Proposition No. 1 would permit the District to levy for collection beginning in 2006 a regular property tax for fire protection services at the rate of \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, thereby lifting the revenue limitation in Chapter 84.55 RCW. Should Proposition No. 1 be approved or rejected?

Explanatory Statement: Pierce County Fire Protection District 18 is placing a lid lift proposition on the September 20, 2005 ballot authorizing property tax levels for fire protection and emergency services over the 1% limitation imposed by Initiative 747.

Approval of this proposition would allow the District to maintain the current level of basic emergency services, meet the rapidly increasing numbers of emergency service calls, cover increasing operating costs, and supplement existing emergency medical services and emergency response capability. Rejection of this proposition will limit the District's ability to meet the increasing emergency service demands of our growing community.

This proposition meets the requirement of Initiative 747 which mandates that any increase in revenue of more than 1%, over the previous year, be approved by the voters. Authorizing the district's legally recognized funding level of \$1.50 per \$1,000 assessed valuation would allow the District to set an adequate levy rate to meet basic emergency service needs by authorizing an increase in the current levy rate of \$.90 per \$1000 to a rate not to exceed \$1.50 per \$1,000.

Statement For:

The greater Orting Valley has experienced rapid population growth and development.

Demands on our fire department and basic operating costs have increased dramatically. Revenues have not kept pace with the need.

Approving this measure will ensure our fire and emergency services can meet basic public safety needs.

Emergency 9-1-1 calls have increased 33% in the past 12 months alone. Our dedicated volunteer firefighters alone can not meet the demand. This measure will add additional trained personnel on staff and enable the department to replace and upgrade necessary emergency response equipment.

If passed, Proposition No. 2 would, pursuant to RCW 52.06.090, transfer all of the Spring Meadows subdivision and an adjacent four-lot short plat southeast of said subdivision from District No. 18 into District No. 21. Should Proposition No. 2 be approved or rejected?

Explanatory Statement: Graham Fire & Rescue or Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 21 is placing a proposition on the September 20, 2005 ballot. The proposition is referred to as a “partial merger”. This proposition is only presented to the registered voters who reside within the subdivision of Spring Meadows and a nearby short plat. The proposition, if approved, would result in a change of fire service provider for those residents and a change in the boundary of Pierce County Fire District No. 21 and Pierce County Fire District No. 18. These voters are currently served by District No. 18.

Resident electors of Spring Meadows and the nearby four-lot short plat have petitioned to change fire districts. The petition has been approved by the Boundary Review Board for Pierce County and the Fire District No. 21 Fire Commissioners. The purpose of the petition is to improve fire protection and emergency medical service.

Statement For:

This issue will have a profound effect on the safety for you, your family, and your property in the event of a fire or medical aid emergency. If this issue is passed, services will be provided by Graham Fire and Rescue (PCFD No. 21) who now serves most of the area around Spring Meadows Housing Development.

The service levels provided by Graham Fire & Rescue are considerably higher than are now being provided by Orting (PCFD No. 18) a mostly all volunteer department.

Graham Fire & Rescue service included multiple manned fire stations with 41 fully paid, highly trained professional firefighters including Paramedic/Firefighters. This will reduce response time since the stations and equipment are manned on a 24/7 basis.

Washington State law controls the funding levels of all fire districts, which means the taxes paid by homeowners will be nearly the same.
